

**MISSING WOMEN COMMISSION OF INQUIRY**

**AFFIDAVIT**

I, Corporal Mike Hall of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police ("RCMP") "E" Division, in the City of Vancouver, in the Province of British Columbia MAKE OATH AND SAY THAT:

1. I am a Corporal with the Surrey RCMP detachment's Major Crime Section, Unsolved Homicide Unit. I have had conduct of the Angela Williams investigation since approximately July 2007. Attached as **Exhibit "A"** to this Affidavit is a copy of my curriculum vitae.
2. I have personal knowledge of the matters and facts as set out in this Affidavit except where stated to be based on information and belief, and where so stated I believe them to be true.

**A. Angela Williams Investigation**

3. As I have had conduct of the Angela Williams investigation since July 2007, I have personal knowledge of the investigation since July 2007. I further have knowledge of the investigation and investigative steps taken prior to July 2007 as I have reviewed the Angela Williams file.
4. From my review of the Angela Williams file, I have set out below the investigative steps that are relevant to the Missing Women Commission of Inquiry and, in particular, those steps relevant to **CI-PERS** testimony on October 26, 2011.

**i. December 13, 2001, on scene investigation of the then unidentified deceased female**

5. On December 13, 2001, a deceased female, later identified as Ms. Williams, was found near the side of a road in Surrey, B.C. Corporal David Attew was one of the Surrey RCMP members who attended the scene when Ms. Williams' body was found. Investigators treated Ms. Williams' death as suspicious from the moment the body was reported to the RCMP.
6. In the file Corporal Attew notes that Ms. Williams was found facedown on the side of a road frequently used by vehicles but very unlikely to be used by anyone to walk to a destination, especially during the night. An unsigned investigation report in the Angela Williams file, dated December 14, 2001, states that Ms. Williams' body may have been dumped due to the area in which her body was found.
7. With respect to the examination of Ms. Williams' body on scene, Corporal Attew found that Ms. Williams' body displayed no visible defensive wounds and no visible signs of trauma other than a small amount of blood coming from the nose and right eye area. Coroner Chico Newell attended the scene and Ms. Williams' body was further examined. The on-scene examination of Ms. Williams' skull revealed no blood or trauma.
8. Corporal Attew and the other members on scene were assisted by the Surrey RCMP's Forensic Identification Unit in collecting evidence from the scene including a jacket and fibres and hairs found on Ms. Williams' clothing. Constable Frank Ducros attended the scene with a police dog and conducted a search of the area around where Ms. Williams' body was located but no evidence was recovered as a result. Members of the Forensic Identification Section examined the scene taking photographs and video of the scene and, in particular, tire marks observed on the road.
9. The Forensic Identification Unit also took fingerprints at the scene from the then unidentified female and sent the fingerprints for processing. The fingerprints were reviewed for possible matches but none were found.

**ii. Investigation prior to the identification of the deceased as Ms. Williams**

10. On December 13, 2001, Coroner Newell advised Surrey investigators that there was a missing woman from Burnaby who may match the then unidentified female body found in Surrey, but it was determined, based on the description of the missing woman, that she was not the deceased.

11. On December 14, 2001, Corporal Attew of the Surrey RCMP Serious Crime Section attended the autopsy of the then unknown female body. The autopsy was performed by Forensic Pathologist, Dr. Charlesworth. The autopsy revealed a small amount of bruising on the right and left arms, but there were no visible markings that would indicate drug use. Dr. Charlesworth examined the exterior surface of the neck twice but could find no evidence of an ante mortem injury. A layered dissection of the neck musculature revealed a small amount of internal bruising. Dr. Charlesworth found that the bruising was unlikely to be the cause of death but it could also not be ruled out. Dr. Charlesworth could not determine a cause of death from the autopsy and found that a toxicology examination would be required. Ms. Williams' death continued to be treated as suspicious despite the fact that a cause of death was not determined during the autopsy.
12. On December 19, 2001, Corporal Attew forwarded a photograph of Ms. Williams to the Surrey RCMP VICE Unit and all members of the Surrey RCMP detachment to see if any members could identify her, but no identification was made.
13. On December 21, 2001, Constable Tim Shields of the Surrey RCMP issued a press release along with a composite image of Ms. Williams to the media in order to seek the public's assistance in identifying her. The press release included basic information such as where and when the female was located as well as a clothing description. The press release also stated that the death was being treated as suspicious, although the cause of her death was not yet known. Attached as **Exhibit "B"** to this Affidavit is a copy of the December 21, 2001, press release.
14. Also on December 21, 2001, Constable Tim Shields of the Surrey RCMP emailed Staff Sergeant Don Adam of Project Evenhanded regarding the then unidentified female to determine whether Project Evenhanded could identify the female as one of the missing women. Attached as **Exhibit "C"** to this Affidavit is a copy of the December 21, 2001, email.
15. I am informed by Sergeant Ron Palta of the RCMP, "E" Division, Missing Women Commission Liaison Team, and believe that from January to October 2003, Project Evenhanded conducted multiple reviews of the Surrey RCMP's file for the Angela Williams investigation. Initially Project Evenhanded investigators reviewed the Angela Williams file to determine whether there was any information from the Surrey RCMP investigation that would support Project Evenhanded in its investigation of the missing women. Beginning in April 2002, Project Evenhanded investigators conducted further reviews of the Angela Williams file and took some investigative steps to determine if there were any links between Angela Williams and Robert Pickton. Project Evenhanded

investigators determined from the file reviews that there was no evidence that might assist the investigation of the missing women and no links to Robert Pickton.

16. On December 21, 2001, Sylvia Port of the ViCLAS Rapid Identification program contacted the Surrey RCMP regarding a possible match to the female found in Surrey based on a similar looking photograph. The possible match was not Ms. Williams and no identification was made.
17. On December 24 and 25, 2001, the Surrey RCMP received seven phone calls from the public and a Crime Stoppers tip in relation to the press release and possible identification of the deceased female found in Surrey. All the tips were eliminated upon a comparison of the description provided with that of the deceased.
18. On December 26, 2001, CI-PERS [REDACTED] the foster mother of Ms. Williams' children, reported Ms. Williams missing to the Vancouver Police Department.
19. On December 28, 2001, the Surrey RCMP received a fax from CI-PERS [REDACTED] William's sister. The fax was a copy of a missing person poster for Ms. Williams along with her description.
20. Dr. Charlesworth summarized the findings from his December 14, 2001, autopsy of Ms. Williams in his autopsy report dated December 30, 2001.
21. On December 31, 2001, Sylvia Port of ViCLAS contacted the VPD and advised them that their missing person, Angela Williams, may be the deceased female located in Surrey. The VPD then faxed a copy of their missing person report for Ms. Williams to the Surrey RCMP.
22. On January 2, 2002, Constable Rob Marshall, an investigator with the Surrey RCMP Serious Crime Section, was contacted by CI-PERS [REDACTED] who informed him that Ms. Williams was missing and had not been seen since December 9, 2001. Constable Marshall advised Ms. Williams that he believed Ms. Williams' dental charts were being compared by the Forensic Dentist. CI-PERS [REDACTED] provided Constable Marshall with the contact information for Ms. Williams' dentist and denturist.
23. On January 2, 2002, Constable Marshall was also contacted by CI-PERS [REDACTED] who expressed that she was concerned about her sister's disappearance and was wondering if the body found in Surrey had been identified. Constable Marshall advised CI-PERS [REDACTED] that no identification had been made. CI-PERS [REDACTED] informed Constable Marshall that she wished to be contacted as soon as an identification was made either way.



24. On January 3, 2002, Corporal Attew contacted Dr. Serine who identified the unknown deceased female as Ms. Williams through Ms. Williams' dental charts.

**iii. Investigative steps after the identification of Ms. Williams as the deceased**

25. On or about January 3, 2002, Corporal Attew contacted [REDACTED] as Ms. Williams' next of kin, and informed her that Ms. Williams' body was found in Surrey. [REDACTED] told Corporal Attew that she had already been informed about Ms. Williams. Corporal Attew was going to contact [REDACTED] after Ms. Williams' funeral.
26. On January 8, 2002, Constable Shields disclosed a press release to the media identifying the female body found in Surrey as Angela Hazel Williams. The press release noted that Ms. Williams had not suffered any obvious trauma and that her death was being treated as suspicious. The press release requested the public's assistance. Attached as **Exhibit "D"** to this Affidavit is a copy of the January 8, 2002, press release.
27. On January 9, 2002, Corporal Attew spoke with Dr. Huckin of the Toxicology Laboratory who advised that he had determined that Ms. Williams did not die of an overdose and that he still had to conduct further examinations to determine the cause of her death.
28. Corporal Attew also contacted Dr. Charlesworth on January 9, 2002, to discuss the possibility of Ms. Williams' death being due to strangulation. Dr. Charlesworth advised Corporal Attew that he had not yet seen the toxicology report but that he had not ruled out strangulation due to the bruising on Ms. Williams' throat. Dr. Charlesworth informed Corporal Attew that he would prepare a full post-mortem report and forward it to Corporal Attew.
29. On January 14, 2002, Dr. Huckin issued the toxicology report for Ms. Williams, which indicated that a low level of gamma hydroxybutyrate, commonly known as GHB, was located in Ms. Williams' blood, but neither ethyl alcohol nor cocaine was found in her blood or urine.
30. On January 16, 2002, Corporal Attew contacted [REDACTED] to find out if she could provide any information with regard to Ms. Williams' activities before her death. Ms. [REDACTED] informed Corporal Attew that she had not had contact with her sister other than by phone and that Ms. Williams had a drug problem and was working as a sex trade worker. [REDACTED] advised Corporal Attew that the best person to talk to about Ms. Williams would be her other sister [REDACTED] or [REDACTED].

31. On January 16, 2002, the Surrey RCMP submitted a ViCLAS report for Ms. Williams listing her file as "sudden death, foul play suspected".
32. On January 21, 2002, Corporal Attew spoke with CI-PERS who advised that she had just remembered some further details about potential persons of interest. Corporal Attew notes in the file that he was going to set up an interview with CI-PERS to obtain more information about the persons of interest.
33. On January 22, 2002, Corporal Attew interviewed CI-PERS regarding Ms. Williams and CI-PERS provided background information about Ms. Williams.
34. On February 25, 2002, Corporal Attew contacted the Centre for Disease Control as Ms. Williams had received medications from there prior to her death. Corporal Attew received a list of the medications Ms. Williams had been prescribed and provided the list to Dr. Charlesworth in case the medications could be related to a potential cause of death and would assist Dr. Charlesworth in completing the final examination of Ms. Williams.
35. Dr. Charlesworth provided his conclusions from Ms. Williams' autopsy in his final pathologist's report dated April 2, 2002. Dr. Charlesworth summarized both the results of the autopsy and the toxicology analysis. Based on the autopsy and toxicology analyses the cause of Ms. Williams' death was undetermined.
36. On May 22, 2002, Coroner Newell provided the final autopsy and toxicology reports for Ms. Williams to Corporal Attew. Dr. Charlesworth reported Ms. Williams' cause of death as undetermined but makes mention of the bruising to Ms. Williams' arm, wrist and the interior of her neck. Corporal Attew notes in the file that it is evident that there are still some concerns with the bruising and the investigation will continue to attempt to piece together Ms. Williams' movements prior to her body being found.
37. On May 22, 2002, Corporal Attew spoke with CI-PERS regarding Ms. Williams' ex-boyfriend. Corporal Attew also left a voicemail message for CI-PERS regarding the coroner's final report.
38. On May 30, 2002, Corporal Attew contacted CI-PERS regarding any sex trade workers known to associate with Ms. Williams but CI-PERS had not been able to gather any such information.
39. On December 11, 2002, Coroner Newell provided Corporal Attew with his Judgment of Inquiry into the death of Ms. Williams and classified the cause of her death as "Undetermined".



**B. Further Interaction with CI-PERS**

40. On February 24, 2003, Sergeant Knoll of Project Evenhanded met with CI-PERS regarding the Angela Williams investigation.
41. On March 18, 2003, Sergeant Knoll spoke with CI-PERS regarding obtaining a recent photograph of Ms. Williams.
42. On November 10, 2004, Sergeant Jim Gresham of the Surrey RCMP Major Crime Section contacted CI-PERS and updated her on the investigation. CI-PERS advised that she had been contacted by Project Evenhanded and discussed the investigation into Ms. Williams' death.
43. On November 24, 2004, Constable Eldon Draude of the Surrey RCMP Serious Crime Section contacted CI-PERS and advised her that Ms. Williams' death was still under investigation and that he was the lead investigator and her point of contact for the investigation.
44. On November 25, 2004, Constable Draude spoke with CI-PERS regarding the investigation into Ms. Williams' death. CI-PERS specifically wanted more information about what the coroner discovered about Ms. Williams' death as, when she had spoken with the coroner, she was informed that the cause of death was unknown. Constable Draude informed CI-PERS that the cause of Ms. Williams' death was still undetermined. Constable Draude further advised CI-PERS that Ms. Williams had bruising on her neck but it could not be determined if the injury that caused the bruising also caused Ms. Williams' death. CI-PERS told Constable Draude that she wished to be kept updated on the investigation.
45. On November 30, 2004, Constable Draude spoke with CI-PERS about the investigation into Ms. Williams' death and potential persons of interest. CI-PERS informed Constable Draude that she wished to continue to have contact with him; however she did not require follow-up calls unless there was new information about Ms. Williams' case.
46. On March 13, 2006, Constable Draude spoke with CI-PERS and advised her that the investigation had yielded no new information to date. CI-PERS asked Constable Draude about Victims Assistance counselling and stated that she had started to fill out the forms but had a few questions. Constable Draude advised CI-PERS that he would have Victims Assistance contact her to assist her with the forms. CI-PERS stated that she would like to be contacted on a regular basis. Constable Draude also spoke with CI-PERS

CI-PERS who stated that she had no questions at that time but would also like to be contacted on a regular basis.

47. On September 7, 2006, Constable Draude contacted CI-PERS and advised her that no further information had been learned in the investigation into Ms. Williams' death. CI-PERS advised that Ms. Williams' daughters wished to visit the location where Ms. Williams' body was found and Constable Draude provided her with the approximate location.
48. On January 3, 2007, Constable Draude contacted CI-PERS husband and provided him with an update on the investigation. As there was no new information CI-PERS was to contact Constable Draude if she had any questions. Constable Draude also spoke with CI-PERS and provided her with an update of the investigation. CI-PERS requested that she be updated on a regular basis.
49. On June 25, 2007, Corporal Shawn Boudreau, the supervisor of the Surrey RCMP Unsolved Homicide Unit, and another RCMP member accompanied CI-PERS and two of Ms. Williams' daughters to the area where Ms. Williams' body was found. Corporal Boudreau says that this meeting with CI-PERS was his only involvement with the Angela Williams file.
50. I am informed by Corporal Boudreau that he cannot recall which RCMP member accompanied him to the meeting with CI-PERS on June 25, 2007. I am informed by Corporal Boudreau that he believes it was Constable Draude who accompanied him to the meeting with CI-PERS but he cannot recall. I spoke with Constable Draude and he informed me that he did not attend the June 25, 2007, meeting with CI-PERS and that he left the Surrey RCMP detachment in the spring of 2007. The only other member of the Unsolved Homicide Unit in June 2007 was Constable Paul Dadwal. I spoke with Constable Dadwal and he informed me that he did not attend the June 25, 2007, meeting with CI-PERS.
51. On May 21, 2008, I phoned CI-PERS and informed her that I had taken over the Angela Williams investigation and wanted to introduce myself. CI-PERS informed me that she had last spoken with the police in relation to Ms. Williams' homicide investigation approximately one year prior when she had taken Ms. Williams' daughter to see the place where Ms. Williams was found.
52. On May 22, 2008, I phoned CI-PERS and asked how often she wished to receive updates on Ms. Williams' investigation. CI-PERS informed me that she only wanted an



update on the investigation if there were any significant developments. I asked CI-PERS if she would like Victims Assistance and CI-PERS declined.

53. On November 17, 2011, I phone CI-PERS and advised that there have been no further developments in the Angela Williams investigation since our conversation on May 22, 2008. CI-PERS recalled the May 22, 2008, conversation but stated that she would now like an update on the investigation.
54. On December 6, 2011, I phoned CI-PERS and advised her that the B.C. Coroner's Service had confirmed that no second autopsy or second toxicology examination had been performed on Ms. Williams.

**C. No second toxicology or autopsy examination performed**

55. I have reviewed the Angela Williams file and I did not find any indication of a presumption on the part of the investigators, the Coroner or the Forensic Pathologist that Ms. Williams' death was due to a drug overdose. As Dr. Charlesworth could not determine Ms. Williams' cause of death from the December 14, 2001, autopsy, Dr. Charlesworth requested a toxicology examination to further assist in determining the cause of death.
56. From my review of the file I can also advise that there is no record of a second autopsy or second toxicology report being requested or being performed. I am informed by Sergeant Ron Palta of the RCMP, "E" Division, Missing Women Commission Liaison Team, and believe that he has confirmed with the BC Coroners Service that no second toxicology or autopsy examinations were performed on Ms. Williams.
57. On January 8, 2002, Corporal Ted VanOverbeek of Project Evenhanded attended the Surrey RCMP detachment to review the Angela Williams file. In his January 8, 2002, Continuation Report for the file review, Corporal VanOverbeek notes:

*It was felt by both investigators and the Coroner's Office that she had probably overdosed. Since this was not the case the Coroner ordered a second autopsy which was to be done 2002-01-07 to attempt to establish a cause of death.*

Attached as **Exhibit "E"** to this Affidavit is a copy of Corporal VanOverbeek's January 8, 2002, Continuation Report.

58. On February 1, 2012, I met with Corporal VanOverbeek at the Surrey RCMP detachment so that he could review the Angela Williams file to clarify his comments regarding a

second autopsy. I was advised by Corporal VanOverbeek that he believes that he was mistaken in his January 8, 2002, Continuation Report as, based on his February 1, 2012, file review, there was only one autopsy ordered for the Angela Williams case and that the cause of Ms. Williams' death could not be determined.

**D. Testimony of CI-PERS**


59. I have reviewed an excerpt of the transcript of CI-PERS testimony before the Commission and during her testimony CI-PERS referred to an interaction she had with two RCMP officers who, on June 25, 2007, accompanied her and Ms. Williams' children to the area where Ms. Williams' body was found. CI-PERS testified as follows on page 32, lines 1-7, of the October 26, 2011, hearing transcript:

*He took me aside and he said, "You'll have to tell her this gently," but he said, "It's pretty clear to us that she died from manual strangulation." He says the only thing – as far as we're concerned it's murder, but we can't determine at this point how premeditated or intentional it was.*

Attached as **Exhibit "F"** to this Affidavit is an excerpt from the October 26, 2011, hearing transcript of CI-PERS testimony.

60. Corporal Boudreau was one of the two officers who accompanied CI-PERS on June 25, 2007. Corporal Boudreau was not the investigator assigned to the Angela Williams file, but he was the supervisor of the Unsolved Homicide Unit. Corporal Boudreau informed me that he did not discuss the results of the autopsy with CI-PERS nor did he offer any opinion as to the cause of Ms. Williams' death.

**Supervisory Experience:**

Major Crime Section – Unsolved Homicide Unit – Since being promoted to the Unit in July 2007, I have been responsible for the supervision of five members of the Unit, as well as several other members who have assisted the Unit on a temporary basis. I have been involved in the over site of the investigations undertaken by the Unit as a member of the Command Triangle (Primary Investigator – File Coordinator), and as a supervisor within the Unit. I am currently the acting Sergeant/NCO i/c of the Unit and also responsible for supervising the detachment Interview Team.

Major Crime Section – General Investigation Section – I was designated as the senior investigator on my team, and was responsible for the supervision of three members, and over site of the investigations undertaken by the team.

General Duties (Uniform Patrol) – I was responsible for the training and supervision of two new members of the RCMP during their six month recruit field training.

**Investigational Experience:**

Major Crime Section – Unsolved Homicide Unit – I am responsible for investigating unsolved homicides (pre IHIT) and suspicious missing persons where foul play is suspected. During the course of these

investigations I have undertaken all roles, including that of the Primary Investigator, File Coordinator, Affiant, interviewer and investigator. The primary functions of this Unit is to conduct thorough reviews of these investigations and develop action plans to advance them. I am currently the primary investigator on 27 homicide/missing persons investigations dating back to 1967. Although not all of these investigations have active investigations underway, I am responsible for conducting reviews of them and identifying avenues to further them, including crime scene re-examinations, re-submission of exhibits for forensic examination based upon advances in forensic and DNA analysis, witness and suspect interviews and covert investigative techniques such as undercover operations. I am also responsible for identifying a next-of-kin point of contact and establishing a relationship and agreed upon contact schedule with that person.

Major Crime Section – Serious Crime Unit - I was primarily responsible for investigating serious offences against persons including attempted murder, aggravated assault, and kidnappings. I undertook all roles within an investigation, including that of the Primary Investigator, File Coordinator, Affiant, interviewer and investigator. One of the main functions of this Unit was to attend crime scenes and conduct thorough crime scene examinations. Another key function of the unit was to provide the primary assistance to the Integrated Homicide Investigation Team with respect to the initial investigation and scene examination of homicides.

Major Crime Section – General Investigation Section – I was primarily responsible for investigating serious offences against persons including attempted murder, aggravated assault, and sexual assault. I undertook all roles within an investigation, including that of the Primary Investigator, Team Leader, File Coordinator, Affiant, interviewer and investigator. One of the main functions of this Unit was to attend crime scenes and provide assistance to other units including Serious Crime and General Duty. Another key function of the unit was to provide the primary assistance to the Integrated Homicide Investigation Team with respect to the initial investigation and scene examination of homicides.

The woman has now been identified as Angela Hazel Williams, a 31-year-old Vancouver resident who was reported missing in Vancouver on December 26th.



Attendance to Surrey detachment where their file 2001-131329 was reviewed.

On 2001-12-13 at approx. 0750hrs a father and son were driving on Colebrook Road in the 13200 block when they saw a body laying on the side of the road. The males got out of the vehicle and soon discovered that the female was dead. The two called 911 and police attended.

The body was found lying face down and full clothed and was still warm to the touch. The female was wearing a blue sweater coat, orange sweat shirt, blue jeans, orange sweat pants, underwear, socks and black runner. There were no visible signs of trauma and it appeared that she had fallen to the ground. The area in which she was found is an open agricultural area with a few homes, deep ditches and it is not a thoroughfare to any other community or sub division.

Only one witness has been found who advised that she had seen the female walking on the road a few moments prior to her being found, and she appeared to be clutching her stomach area. It appeared to this witness that the person was in some distress.

The autopsy was completed and apart from a slight bruise on the arm there were no signs of visible trauma or sexual assault. Samples were sent to the lab for toxicology examination.

On Saturday 2002-02-05 the victim was positively identified as WILLIAMS. **CI-PERS** is the foster mother to WILLIAMS's children and had last seen her on 2001-12-09. **CI-PERS** advised that WILLIAMS did work the street from time to time and had an alcohol and cocaine problem.

The result to the toxicology was received and there was only a trace amount of cocaine in her system. It was felt by both the investigators
